Worship Planner

May 1st, 3rd Sunday of Easter, Pastor Enno will be on vacation and Ben Steckelberg will be filling the pulpit this Sunday.

May 8th, 4th Sunday of Easter, we are going to dive into the Book of Revelation starting a heavenly scene of all the nations coming together. Let's imagine what that would look like, who is there and think if there would be anyone missing. We will talk about how Revelation has been viewed and interpreted and does this book have anything to say to us today in our world-shaken times of plagues and wars.

May 15th, 5th Sunday of Easter, on this Sunday will continue our dive in Revelation in looking at one of it's more known scriptures, "I will make a new heaven and a new earth..." What does this mean for us who are trying to save this planet and the life of all plants, bugs, birds, animals, and all the breathes? Is this a futuristic prediction, a literal fact, or is there a message that transcends the wildness of the visions and prophecies for our planet and us?

May 22nd, 6th Sunday of Easter, on this Sunday, we will take time to have some conversations about who we are as a church, where do we think we are going, and how are we going to get there. Our leadership is looking at creating a new mission statement, looking at who we are becoming, and what are the needs and priorities of our building and grounds that help us live out our faith and mission.

May 29th, 7th Sunday of Easter, on this fifth Sunday of May, Pastor Enno will pause in his preaching so that he may listen and hear your questions about faith, God, church, and the world. There is often a good conversation and the fodder of knowing what is on your minds.

DESIGNATED PASTOR'S MESSAGE

The Rev. Enno Limvere

Woe, that things would be good or evil and there would always be the right way to do things. The Russian invasion of Ukraine is definitely as close to the evil as we can get in this world. How we respond to this act of war and maybe even genocide is much more complicated and not as easy to discern. Do we send more than just weapons and food? Do we send troops or commit to drone strikes against the mile's long columns of the invading Russian forces? Do we attack the Russian army on their land through missiles, bombers, and other means to keep them away from the Ukrainian people?

When our country invaded Iraq, there was much criticism that some troops didn't have body armor and many Humvees where not armored either. The Secretary of Defense Rumsfeld stated you go to war with the army you have, not the army you want. The Russian army is finding out that they aren't as powerful and as nimble as they once thought. But they are much more numerous and have more bombs than the country of Ukraine.

Ukraine's defense budget was around \$6 billion dollars in 2019, Russia's was around \$60 billion, and the United States was about \$800 billion. That along with NATO, we could easily enter the war and defend Ukraine and drive Russia out. Then we would have to decide if we just go with Desert Storm in 1991 where we pushed back Saddam Hussein or go full bore and go after him until he is dead. Do we just push Putin out of Ukraine or bring him to trial for war crimes, terrorism, and genocide?

While we debate and discuss this in our safe communities, in a nation that hasn't had a bomb dropped on it in 80 years, there are innocent people dying from bombs, from executions, and from starvation and the elements. We are not powerless, but we are not in control. We are helping as a nation in giving weapons, supplies, and rallying the nations around the world in non-violence of sanctions. We are helping, as communities, faiths, and organizations, to help the refugees find food, shelter, and maybe a new home.

I wish there was a clear path to stop the invasion, the suffering, the genocide. I pray for that path to come, for wisdom for all nations leaders on how to put an end to this and all wars. We are not powerless, but we are not in control. We need wisdom, O LORD, give us wisdom and compassion for those who are suffering and those who have lost all.

CARE OF THE EARTH

Support the Fond du Lac Band's Objection to the Polymet Permit: Protect the St. Louis River and Lake Superior Watersheds

The Fond du Lac Band of Lake Superior Chippewa has exercised its rights under the Clean Water Act Section 401(a)(2) to object to the U.S. Army Corps PolyMet federal wetlands destruction permit on the grounds that the PolyMet mine would contaminate its reservation waters on the St. Louis River with toxic mercury, contaminating fish and killing aquatic life.

Neither federal nor state permits protect downstream Fond du Lac Reservation waters from PolyMet mine pollution.

The U.S. Army Corps will hold a hearing on the Band's objection from May 3-5, and the U.S. EPA will make its recommendation.

In his Easter message, Dorhauer calls for resurrection of peace, hope, love by UCC Leadership | published on Apr 14, 2022

In his Easter message, United Church of Christ General Minister and President John C. Dorhauer is calling for a season of resurrection — a resurrection of peace, a resurrection of hope and a resurrection of love. All, he said, are needed in the world and readily available to us.

He spoke of "peace in the world, in our hearts and our communities"; hope for the health of the earth, its people and "what tomorrow can look like"; and love to bridge "deep chasms between political and religious beliefs" and "restore broken relationships."

UCC General Minister and President John Dorhauer delivers his 2022 Easter message.

"Hello, dear friends in the United Church of Christ. I bring you Easter greetings. I want to begin my brief reflection with words that have sustained me through this season of pandemic. And I want to close this brief reflection with a different set of words that have sustained me through this time of pandemic.

"The first set of words come to us from a deacon of the Coventry Church of the Reformed Church of Great Britain, spoken in 1949 when they were trying to call a new pastor after the church in the town of Coventry had been carpet bombed into oblivion during the second World War. And the deacon said to the pastor they were trying to call, 'there is nothing in this church that cannot be changed so long as the Gospel is preached in the Kin-dom of God proclaimed.'

"I've held fast to those words throughout the season of pandemic, reminding myself that there is nothing in our church that cannot change so long as the Gospel is proclaimed and the Kin-dom of God is preached. So let's keep doing that as we have been, regardless of the circumstances. And in this time of Easter season, I am calling for a season of resurrection, a resurrection of peace in the world in our hearts, in our communities.

"As the globe is torn apart by wars in Syria, Myanmar, the South Sudan,

other hot spots, and of late Ukraine, we call for a resurrection of and a commitment to peace. We call for a resurrection of hope. It's two years now, plus, of quarantining ourselves and isolating ourselves to protect us and our loved ones from the pandemic. It's wearing us down and eroding our commitment to hope about what tomorrow can look like.

"The globe, threatened by warming, and in the call for climate justice, has us all concerned about our future health as individuals, as the human community, and as the planet that we love and occupy. And so I'm calling for a resurrection of hope in and through this time, and a resurrection of love. We all are on our social media platforms, are fed by algorithms that read our political minds and inclinations and continue to feed us political materials that reinforce our biases and identify friends that think the same thing – the way we do.

"All of that and so many other things are creating deep chasms between political and religious beliefs and we need to resurrect love and restore broken relationships. I do pray that this season of Easter sees the resurrection pf peace, a resurrection of hope, a resurrection of love, all of which we are in need of, and all of which, through the resurrected Christ and the movement of Christ's Holy Spirit, are readily available to us.

"I want to close with these words that also, through this time of pandemic, have grounded me. And they come from the great mystic Julian of Norwich, who said through a hard time of pandemic, 'All shall be well, and all shall be well,' Indeed Christ is risen. He is risen indeed, and all shall be well."
