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WORSHIP IN DECEMBER Sunday Worship at 10:30 AM

December 4th -2nd Sunday of Advent - Peace, we end our Stewardship drive by looking back at the early Christian community and how they came together, learning how to pray, grow, and share. May we have hearts and minds and a strong community that echoes their Faith and Giving.

December 11th 3rd Sunday of Advent - Love, love is patient and kind, but it also seeks the best for our neighbors and even our enemies, which is why justice cannot be separated out from God's kindom or loving our neighbors. The Gospel of Matthew tells the story of John the Baptist sending disciples to Jesus in order to find out if Jesus is truly the Christ, the Messiah. Jesus responds in a surprising way.

December 11th— 4:00PM -Blue Christmas Service, many people struggle through the holidays for a variety of reasons. They can't find peace, love, or joy and have little hope that it' going to get better. Come and join us to remember that all don't have a Merry Christmas and that it is alright to have feelings of anxiety, depression, grief, and even anger. During this service, we will also be honoring and remembering EvaLyn Carlson

December 18th—4th Sunday of Advent- Joy, on this Sunday, it is time to get together and have some fun. We will be inviting everyone and anyone to show up at 9:30 to practice for our Christmas Pageant 2022. We will need narrators, Mary and Joseph, Shepherds, Angels, Wise Ones, and an Inn Keeper. We also need townspeople to keep us going.

December 24th—Christmas Eve Service, we will gather once again outside to sing some Christmas carols and then go inside the sanctuary to hear the story of Jesus' birth as told by the Gospel of Luke. We will end our service with candle lighting and singing Silent Night to fill the world with the peace that passes all understanding.

No Christmas Day Service: Sleep in and spend time with family and friends.

Pastor's Column

We know that Advent is a season of preparation. We decorate our homes, bake Christmas cookies, prepare Christmas cards, buy, and wrap Christmas presents, prepare ourselves for the Christmas parties we don't want to go to, traveling by car or plane, receiving guests, and, for some people, we prepare for the assault of our senses with lights, smells, and songs that seem to blast 24/7.

Advent is the beginning of the church's calendar year. We are preparing for the birth of Jesus. The church also tells us we are preparing for the return of Jesus. That is why we often have the prophets speaking during the season of Advent focusing on John the Baptist who helps to prepare the way, not just for the Babe in the Manger, but for Jesus' ministry as well.

Advent can also be a time to prepare to meet the incarnate Christ. The one with flesh and bone, joys, and sorrows. Namaste is the Buddhist greeting of the god in me greets the god in you. Jesus tells us that he is in God's heart and God is in his and we can be in their heart and them in ours. AND, we also have Jesus tell us that as we have helped the least of these, we have helped him. In other words, our neighbor, created in the image of God, is the person in whom we find Christ. "Where two or three are gathered, I am also there."

We need joy! We need to be surrounded by love, music, sights, smells, and good things that remind us that the world and all that is in it is God's and blessed. Good things are abundant! There is enough for all our needs! Love is in the air!

We need peace! We need those quiet moments away from the ruckus of the world. We need gentle light, comforting food, and a safe place away from the worries and dangers of the world. We are to lie down in green quilts beside crackling fireplaces.

Thus, sing with gusto and nap when you can. It has never been an either/or, but always is a both/and. Jesus was born in a barn, surrounded by animals, shepherds, angels, and a whole host of people. We sing Joy to the World and Silent Night, hopefully with trumpets and a cappella.

May this Advent and Christmas season bring you a little hope, love, peace, and joy! May we, as the church, bring our community some of those as well.

It all makes me a tad melancholy and looking for ways to add a little light in this time.

There are 3 odd little windows in the house that Jeff built. Every year, after Thanksgiving, I put battery powered candles that glow when it is dark, turn off in the day. It's not an easy job. I have to use a ladder to get to 2 of them, carry it upstairs. The batteries last most of the winter but then the candles wait unlit and gathering dust till next year. It is ridiculous how much these 3 silly plastic candles cheer my heart.... As do the over-the-top bright pink flowered sheets I put on our bed.

Even after dark, I can celebrate that I live in a dark enough place to see the stars, even in town. Winter sunsets and sunrises amaze. And if I'm lucky, I'll see the dancing lights of the aurora borealis.

I love the ritual of the advent candles and the lights for hope, peace, joy, and love. A time to prepare. A time to reflect. What do I hope for? What can I do to bring peace to the world around me? What joy quickened my soul today? How can I show love more fully? We heard a presentation by Sandy Stover on the Maple Hill Cemetery Details later in minutes.

Mission Statement read by Tom

Brief statement of Joys and Concerns by members. Check-in requested for recently widowed member.

Pastor's question omitted due to length of agenda.

Communication Agreement read by Tom.

October BOD minutes previously approved for November newsletter.

Agenda as amended was approved. Motion by Jen Delfs; seconded by Carol Bennett. Unanimous acceptance.

Maple Hill Cemetery:

Sandy Stover, who represents this church on the Cemetery Board, reported on the history and current situation, clarified a number of questions. Noted that the Church voted a few years ago to sell the cemetery, but now that appears unfeasible as it is not possible or cost-effective to contact all heirs of those buried in the cemetery for their approval.

-It is feasible to lease the property to the Maple Hill Cemetery Association for a nominal fee, granting them the obligation for care and management and releasing the church from liability.

-Reviewed a draft Lease Agreement; document needs editing of details to be ready to sign.

-Sandy will write up the history for the January Newsletter in preparation for the January Annual Meeting vote on the lease agreement.

Current business

Financial Report: Kevin LeVoir submitted the written documents in advance of the meeting:

-Income is a few thousand dollars less than budgeted or pledged to date. Expenses were less than anticipated, October cash flow was positive.

-Congregants are to be reminded to complete their pledges before year's end.

-Donations for Neighbors in Need, other national ingatherings received to date have been sent.

-The Bookkeeping software (Quickbooks) will substantially increase the subscription fee in 2023; Alternatives are being sought:

1-Share the prorated cost of software used by the bookkeeper.

2-Subscribe to Realm, the UCC church administration software available from the national setting.

-Draft Budget for 2023 will be presented at the December BOD meeting.

-Motion to accept: Jen Delfs, second John Bottger; Unanimous.

Newsletter articles due: November 28. Jenny will write the Board reflection.

December BOD Meeting: Tuesday, December 13.

<u>Helping Hands Request:</u> A request by a congregant was discussed to have the church enter into what was termed a "helping hands" assistance program to aid individuals in the county who need more help in their lives than is presently available. The services suggested would have varied from giving rides, picking things up for people as well as assisting at their homes- which could involve light plumbing and electrical work. The board agreed there are cases where needs are not being met but to commit the church to such an endeavor, and possible liability, would be difficult. The board concluded that it would be best for our church to support existing programs and assist those in need privately, as most are already doing. The moderator will contact the congregant as soon as possible to explain our decision. Pastor's Report: Pastor Enno sent a report prior to the meeting.

Summer 2023 Youth Trip to Washington, DC

July 21, 2023 - July 28, 2023

Register Now for 2023 Summer High School Youth Trip!

Registration is now open for next summer's youth trip to Washington, D. C., July 21-28, 2023. (See registration links below.) Students from Conference congregations currently enrolled in grades 8-12 are eligible to participate in this service-learning experience focused on the work of legislative advocacy. Following are some of the experiences participants on the trip will engage together:

- 1. Lobby members of congress and their staff about issues selected by the youth
- Visit monuments, memorials, and museums such as Frederick Douglas National Historic Site, Martin Luther King Jr. Memorial, U.S. Holocaust Museum and Memorial, and other significant sites
- 3. Learn about root causes of systemic oppression through direct service opportunities
- 4. Have time for fun, reflection, and conversations that matter!
- 5. We hope these experiences will reinforce the need for participants to agitate for justice and to never be silent in the face of injustice!

Thanks to generous subsidy from the Ashley Endowment of the Minnesota Conference UCC the total cost for the trip is \$825 for youth and \$550 for adult companions. This cost includes round-trip airfare, all ground transportation, lodging, meals, and all activities. An initial deposit of \$200 is required at the time of registration. Registration is open November 1 through January 31, 2023.

The Conference strongly encourages local congregations to actively fundraise to help offset trip costs for participants. The Conference also has additional scholarship funds available to help offset cost for any youth who has need. Each congregational group participating needs to provide 1 adult for every 4 youth participants. The Conference will be able to connect local congregations who would like to work together to provide adequate adult to youth ratios.

Prayers follow mass shooting at LGBTQ club in Colorado Springs

On the eve of Transgender Day of Remembrance, <u>five people were killed in a</u>

<u>mass shooting in an LGBTQ nightclub in Colorado Springs</u>. At least 18 others were injured Saturday evening, Nov. 19, before Club Q patrons subdued the gunman. The <u>Open and Affirming Coalition, United Church of</u> <u>Christ,</u> through Executive Director Andy Lang, immediately offered prayers for those who lost their lives, for those impacted by the violence, and for a future where all are valued. The <u>UCC national officers</u> also issued a statement of support. Here are the text of those statements:

"As Open and Affirming congregations gather today to honor our transgender and nonbinary neighbors who have lost their lives to hatred, we are stunned by the news that a young man inside an LGBTQ club in Colorado Springs last night shot and killed at least five people and injured 18.

"Once again, lives have been irretrievably lost by the rising tide of hatred and gun violence in America.

"As I heard the news this morning, my thoughts went to Jeremiah 31, verse 15: *Thus says the Lord: A voice is heard in Ramah, lamentation and bitter weeping. Rachel is weeping for her children; she refuses to be comforted for her children, because they are no more.*

This morning, we join in prayer for each person murdered or injured last night in Club Q. In the coming days we will know their names. We also pray in union with the Rocky Mountain Conference and especially our Open and Affirming churches in Colorado Springs: First Congregational UCC, Vista Grande Community UCC and Black Forest Community UCC, as well as Church in the Wildwood UCC in neighboring Green Mountain Falls.

"It is not easy to hope in a time like this. Sometimes we need simply to experience the bewilderment and anger that comes when more of God's



children are slain by unreasoning hatred. But there will be a time to hope. The prophet Jeremiah continues in verses 16 and 17:

Thus says the Lord:

Keep your voice from weeping, and your eyes from tears; for there is a reward for your work, says the Lord: they shall come back from the land

of the enemy; there is hope for your future, says the Lord: your children shall come back to their own country.

"Today is also the feast of the Reign of Christ. As a movement, Open and Affirming churches like yours are working for the vision of God's future realm, where everyone is wanted, everyone is needed, and no one is lost to hatred. But that future realm is also taking shape here and now: in your congregations and your families in more than a thousand communities across America. Your mission is to save lives, and there will be a reward for your work: the beloved community where all of God's children can return home."
