## March Worship

Worship is at 10:30AM in person and on Zoom

**March 5, 2<sup>nd</sup> Sunday in Lent**, in March we are going through some of the Gospel of John. We start with the story of Nicodemus and the scripture that has been plastered everywhere John 3:16, “For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life.” What if that wasn’t the point of the story? What other things may be lifted up? How about the world (yes everything) might be saved, not just some, most, or all people?

**March 12, 3<sup>rd</sup> Sunday in Lent**, during this Sunday, we cover most of chapter 4 in sharing the story of the Samaritan Woman at the Well. In this story, we have many boundaries that are crossed with the “Messiah” being alone with a foreign woman, a woman who has ‘had’ many husbands and currently cohabitating with a man, and Samaritans believing a woman they shun.

**March 19, 4<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Lent**, time for another Reader’s Theater! We will be looking for 6 narrators and 6 actors (at least) to walk through the story of Jesus healing a blind man and causing all sorts of drama by the local religious authorities demanding to know who healed him and sinned by working on the Sabbath. The parents are dragged in and they are afraid so they throw their son under the caravan... Contact Pastor Enno to sign up.

**March 26, 5<sup>th</sup> Sunday**, we come upon the story of Lazarus, Martha, and Mary to talk about death and grief. Though the story does end happily (maybe not a happily ever after), it walks us through the stages of grief. This story shows that even Jesus, knowing Lazarus comes back to life, takes time for tears and feeling the loss of a friend. What grief have we had and how do we go through it? We will explore the possibilities this day.

## PASTOR MESSAGE

“If a butterfly flaps its wings in Africa, there is a hurricane in the Caribbean,” posits Chaos Theory. Small little changes that have far reaching effects. When the Gospel of John was written, the writer called Jesus, “Logos” which we hear and interpret today that it means “Word” which is something whole, fulfilled, and unchangeable. In the time of writing the Bible, ‘logos’ was often heard as ‘conversation’. (as read in Church of the Wild by Victoria Looz). Just imagine our Christian religion if our American English Bibles would use “Conversation”:

In the beginning was the Conversation, and the Conversation was with God, and the Conversation was God. The Conversation was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through the Conversation and without the Conversation no one thing came into being. What has come into being in the Conversation was life and the light was the light of all people. The light shines in darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it.

This, in my opinion, does better reflect the Creation Story in Genesis chapter 1: God said, “Let there be light.” And there was light. God said, “Let there be a dome in the midst of the waters, and let it separate the waters from the waters.” God said, “Let the waters under the sky be gathered together into one place and let the dry land appear.” God said, “Let the earth put forth vegetation...” God said, “Let there be lights in the dome of the sky...” God said, “Let the waters bring forth swarms of living creatures, and let the birds fly above the earth...” God said, let the earth bring forth living creatures of every kind: cattle and creeping things and wild animals of the earth of every kind.” God said, “Let us make humankind in our image, according to our likeness...” Sounds like there is a Conversation to me, a call and response.

Can we flutter our wings, if you agree that a relationship with God is a conversation more than obedience? Can we see the care that God put into creating our universe and God didn't do it alone? Can we imagine that God is still speaking, still creating in our world, in our lives, and through the Conversation that was and is and is to come?

I hope our little ripples will flow out and through the world that will bear good fruit in generations to come. May we heal our faith, our world, and bring justice to those who have been left out and left behind.

## A Message From a Board Member

Perhaps it's a sign of aging when one progresses from saying 'We all gotta die sometime' to wondering just exactly how that death will occur. In my career I had many conversations with people about death. Most folks were not afraid of dying, but they were fearful of what they would go through in the course of an illness. It's frightening to think of pain, loss of function, loss of hope, abandonment, side effects of treatment and any number of other bad things that might come our way. Part of our job, as caregivers, is to try to ease that journey. And one thing all of us can do is to tell others we care about them - no need to wait until 'the time is right'.

It must have been very difficult for Jesus to live with the realization that the government was stacked against him and needed to 'eliminate' him as a threat to their power. It must have been frightening to know that he would suffer physical pain and abandonment, that he would be humiliated and mocked. He went through tremendous suffering before and as he died. But he didn't stop at death. He went through death, to the other side.

As a human I don't think I can understand what life after death actually is, but it gives me comfort to think that no matter what is ahead, Jesus will understand from his human experience. And when we reach death's door we won't be stopped at the threshold. Instead, we will be ushered through the doorway into the mystery of new life.

## Protecting God's Gift of Creation – Psalm 24:1

Minnesota Conference 61st Annual Meeting

June 9-10, 2023

College of St. Benedict, St. Joseph, MN, with an online option

We acknowledge the College of Saint Benedict and Saint John's University occupies the original homelands of the Dakhóta and Anishinaabe peoples. We honor, respect, and acknowledge the Indigenous peoples forcibly removed from this territory, whose connection remains today.

The Minnesota Conference will gather in June, building on the hybrid model we inaugurated last year of virtual and in-person workshops, meetings, and worship. We seek to engage our youth and young families, our local congregations, our state, and the Spirit to participate in protecting and renewing the Earth, which is God's and the fullness thereof.

The sacred gift of creation entrusted to us by God is being destroyed. As we imagine and live into the church of the 21st century, let us remember, "The earth is God's, and everything in it, the world, and all who live in it." (Psalm 24:1) Let us come, as children of this sacred creation and the enduring body of Christ, as we are being called forward with the charge of protecting God's gift of creation.

We know that the work of conservation and eco-justice is a familiar one to many of us, while others have struggled to find traction or see any other way forward. Our keynote speaker will be the Rev. Michael Malcom, ordained in the United Church of Christ and founder and executive director of the People's Justice Council in Birmingham, Alabama. He will share how he created an unparalleled opportunity for faith communities throughout Alabama to unite and raise their voice against environmental racism, economic oppression, environmental injustice, and climate change.

In addition, we will create space for your efforts to be uplifted as well. If you have a “Green Team” or lay leadership at your church who wants to share or learn from what other churches are doing, look out for our online workshop earlier that week. Plus, many other workshops will return in-person this year.

## **Deadly earthquake strikes Turkey/Syria border, UCC delegation in Europe connects with partners to respond**

Thousands have been killed in Turkey and Syria by a [massive earthquake](#) that struck Monday morning before dawn on the border of the two countries. The magnitude 7.8 quake, centered in a heavily populated area of southeastern Turkey but felt as far away as Israel and Cyprus, collapsed buildings and buried scores of people in the rubble. The Feb. 6 temblor has already been followed by a series of powerful aftershocks.

A United Church of Christ [delegation in Europe](#) tracking [the Ukraine appeal response](#) has already been in touch with partners in the affected region and sends back the following report.

### **AN ‘ALREADY VULNERABLE’ REGION**

*Thus saith the Lord; A voice was heard in Ramah, lamentation, and bitter weeping; Rahel weeping for her children refused to be comforted for her children, because they were not. Jeremiah 31:15*

“We were awakened to the news of another tragedy in the global community,” said Associate Minister Karen Georgia Thompson. “The impact of this earthquake on the border of Syria and Turkey was felt as far as Cyprus, Lebanon, and Greece. The death toll continues to climb in a region that is already vulnerable as a result of the more than decade long war in Syria.

Rev. Thompson shared this prayer:

*God of grace and mercy, there are many who are suffering loss today. Around the world and in our communities, we are mourning. Today we come holding in our prayers our siblings in Turkey and Syria who are still searching and rescuing survivors and victims of this earthquake. Be present with these families and communities during this time of crisis and need. Be a source of strength and comfort through these days ahead. Help us to be present on behalf of those in need. We pray in Jesus’ name. Amen.*

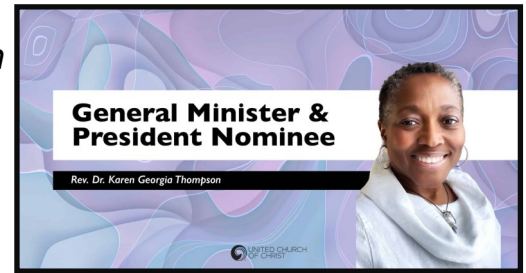
## **UCC GMP Search Committee makes historic choice, recommends Karen Georgia Thompson as next leader**

*After a year-long search, the United Church of Christ Board’s Search Committee for General Minister and President has made a historic choice. The committee will be recommending Rev. Dr. Karen Georgia Thompson to the UCCB this week as nominee*



*for General Minister and President. If elected, she would be the first woman, and the first woman of African descent, to lead the denomination. Below is the letter to the wider church from Search Committee Chair, the Rev. Emma Brewer-Wallin.*



Rev. Thompson inspired the Search Committee when she paired the apparent hopelessness of declining church membership with the possibility of people who are seeking places to form community, to make meaning of life's challenges, and to serve their neighbors. She suggests that among people who might be seeking such a home are the "spiritual-but-not-religious," families who are connected to multiple religious traditions, and people who follow teachings and practices of Christianity alongside another tradition. She affirmed that many UCC congregations are already a place of sanctuary for these kinds of people, and proclaimed the possibility of continuing to foster this type of ministry without letting go of the Christianity that makes us who we are.

### **Manager and Administrator**

Rev. Thompson's care for the staff she works with, supporting them both as people and as leaders, emerged clearly in our conversations with her. She described a practice of leadership development that considers the big picture of the whole church, not only those who are currently working for her, to help ensure that new and emerging leaders are prepared when opportunities to serve arise.

In addition to her aptitude as a manager, Rev. Thompson has demonstrated her savvy of the behind-the-scenes aspects of administration. Her experience overseeing several multi-million-dollar budgets for Wider Church Ministries, General Synod, Global Ministries, and One Great Hour of Sharing prepares her to secure the financial strength of the UCC through sustainable, wise, and responsible fiscal management. As General Synod Administrator, Rev. Thompson emerged as a key pastoral leader during the church's early experience of the pandemic, adapting our 33rd General Synod to a digital environment. Her long tenure with the National Setting means she knows the inner workings of the UCC well, and she has put that knowledge to use in strategizing the realignment of the Common Global Ministries Board with the UCCB.

The church has repeatedly affirmed Karen Georgia Thompson's ministry throughout her tenure in multiple roles of progressive responsibility in the National Setting. After a thorough review by the board, she was recently nominated for a second term as Associate General Minister. With equal confidence in her capabilities as a minister, theologian, and spiritual leader for our church, our Search Committee enthusiastically recommends her as our nominee for General Minister and President.

The United Church of Christ Board will hear from Rev. Thompson at their meeting later this week, March 3-5. I ask for your prayers for Rev. Thompson as she shares her vision, and for the UCCB as they hear it, that this may be a time of fruitful discernment together about what the Church needs in this season.
