## Worship in January

January 7th, 1st Sunday after Epiphany. Jesus is beginning his ministry and word is quickly spreading about his teachings and his healings. In today's story, we have a group of people who literally go above and beyond what is expected to bring their friend to Jesus so that he can walk again. Jesus also takes it up a notch and proclaims this man forgiven, to which the religious leaders respond that it is not possible.

January 14th, 2nd Sunday after Epiphany. This is the first parable that Jesus tells in the Gospels and his ministry. It's a story about planting seeds and, depending on the soil/hearer/person/community, how they flourish or die. How many seeds are we sowing, and in what kind of soil is our church to grow the seeds of love?

January 19th, Friday night service. Many of our younger families, and others, have talked about how Sunday is the only day for them to relax, especially when they live far from Grand Marais. We will be trying a supper and worship on this evening starting at 5:30 pm. More details will be forthcoming.

January 21st, 3rd Sunday after Epiphany. Jesus in his travels goes across the Sea of Galilee to preach and heal to the Gentile (non-Jewish) people. He finds a man possessed, who is shackled and kept away from everybody else. He returns this man to himself healthy and whole. The people who are used to blaming him for all that is wrong, now have a hard time accepting that he can change.

January 28th, 4th Sunday after Epiphany. This is a story of healing that involves a woman who has been ill for 12 years, and a young girl who is 12 years old who is at the point of death. The story also is about how the world then dealt with illness and death.

## Pastor's Column



Declaring one group good, means another group is bad. If there is one good religion, it means another (or all other) groups are bad. One good nation means there are bad nations. This division and black & white

scenario has been in our world for a long, long time, going back to the mythical Cain and Able.

This scenario is playing out in our country today, with the identity politics that the actions of one leader isn't as important as what they are accusing the other side of doing. A former President with 91 felony charges is accusing the current President of being a threat to the democracy of this country.

This is being played out on the international scene, between Israel and Palestine, that has given Israel's 'right to defend itself' a blank check to do whatever they want to whomever they want. In some of our states, there are laws against boycotting Israeli products or protesting Israeli government policies, which could mean you lose grants, funding, or healthcare for speaking your mind.

This is not "Biblical" as some want to tout. # Bruce's Pumpkin Pie Filling Recipe

As featured at this Year's Thanksgiving Meal!

#### The Carnation Pumpkin Pie Recipe for 1 9-inch pie.

(Makes about 1 qt filling.)

1-15 oz can solid pack pumpkin

<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> c. light brown sugar, packed (sub dark brown sugar, for richer flavor)

½ tsp. salt

1 tsp. cinnamon, ground

1/4 tsp. ginger, ground

1/4 tsp. cloves, ground

½ tsp. nutmeg, ground

1-12 oz can evaporated milk

2 eggs, slightly beaten

- 1. Preheat oven to 425 degrees F.
- 2. Empty pumpkin into large mixing bowl. Add sugar, salt and spices. Mix well until there are no lumps.
- 3. Slowly mix in evaporated milk.
- 4.Beat eggs lightly in a separate. Bowl; stir into pumpkin mixture. Pour into pie shell.
- 5.Bake for 15 minutes at 425°.
- 6.Reduce heat to 350 deg. Continue baking for about 40 minutes, until filling is slightly puffed or until knife inserted near center comes out clean.
- 7. To prevent cracking, pros avoid the knife test and bake until filling still quivers slightly in center when gently shaken. Filling will continue to cook and set as pie cools.

#### **Damascus Project Receives \$500,000 Grant**

#### Who will lead us? And where are we going?

Those questions aren't new to congregations, though the pandemic made the answers even more elusive as churches changed course on the fly. New circumstances demanded that leaders tap veins of creativity, flexibility and inspiration that even they didn't know they had.

Fortunately, we confronted these questions with a great resource: the Damascus Project, which builds the leadership capacity of lay people and pastors through online education. The project is the collaborative educational ministry of the UCC's Minnesota and Wisconsin Conferences.

Now, the Damascus Project is poised to take a giant step forward, thanks to a \$500,000 grant from Lilly Endowment through its Thriving Congregations Initiative. The aim of the national initiative is to encourage the flourishing of congregations by helping them deepen their relationships with God, enhance their connections with each other, and contribute to the vitality of their communities and the world.

Over a five-year period, the UCC's Minnesota and Wisconsin Conferences will support the development of two Damascus learning tracks: Thriving Congregations and Living Faith.

"We received this news just days before Thanksgiving, so the week was filled with extra gratitude for the generosity of Lilly Endowment, and the opportunity to expand the reach of the Damascus Project," said the Rev. Dr. Stephanie Perdew, director of the Damascus Project and author of the grant proposal. "We will be happily busy in 2024 as we create new courses, and invite laity, clergy, and young people to learn with us toward the thriving of their congregations and our witness in the world."

Thriving Congregations courses will be geared toward lay leaders and clergy who can learn together about good congregational governance, healthy communication, and community missional assessment. The Living Faith learning track will offer a two-year online Confirmation curriculum that draws young people from small congregations into sizable learning cohorts.

"I couldn't be more excited about this extraordinary grant," said the Rev. Shari Prestemon, Minnesota Conference Minister. "I've always believed the Damascus Project is key to equipping a healthy and vibrant future for congregations and individual members in our two Conferences, and this grant offers an amazing opportunity to realize its full potential. It's incredible news!"

# Christmas Fund: A 'nest egg for future generations' of UCC leaders

For more than a century, annual donations to the <u>Christmas Fund</u> have supported United Church of Christ clergy and lay employees.

Advocates of the fund are asking for gifts to help that continue for another 100 years.

"Most Americans live paycheck to paycheck; UCC clergy and lay staff are no exception," said the Rev. Paul Ramsey, philanthropy officer for the Pension Boards, which manages the Christmas Fund. "Those who donate are providing a nest egg for future generations to support those who have answered the call."

#### 'Love requires deeds'

In 2022, more than \$2 million in Christmas Fund grants were distributed through "thank you" gifts, pension and health supplements, ministerial assistance, emergency grants and more — much of it supporting lower-income retirees.

In 2022, more than \$1 million were distributed to support UCC pensions — along with another \$1 million more in gifts, grants and supplements — thanks to generous donations to the Christmas Fund.

In <u>a video appeal</u>, the Rev. John Henry Scott III read through letters of gratitude from recipients of Christmas Fund gifts and asked for continued support for those in need.

"Now it's time for you — that's right, you — to bring the abundant life, the fullness of Christ, through your generous donations, through your generous gifts," said Scott, who is the founding pastor of Jesus Stands for Love and Justice Ministries, Inc., and a member of <u>Dunbar UCC in Hamden, Conn.</u> "As the Gospel proclaims through Christ's fullness, we have all received grace upon grace."

Recalling words from his father, Scott reflected on the example of love in action that comes through generous donations to the Christmas Fund.

"My late dad, he was a pastor, an educator, an army chaplain. He was fond of saying, 'Love without works is dead. Love requires deeds," Scott said. "How true."

#### Justice and equity

Besides its significant support for retired pastors, the Christmas Fund gifts can also help balance out disparities in compensation that unfortunately still persist among underrepresented groups.

Ramsey noted that a higher percentage of clergy of color, queer clergy and women clergy often need extra support because of having lower salaries on average. "I believe it is a justice and equity issue," he said.

# 'Commemorating' Christmas Amid Crisis in Gaza: UCC General Minister & President Shares Message

"In this season of Advent, of hope and preparation, we recognize that not all is well in the world. There is war and strife among us."

While many around the world prepare to celebrate Christmas, the United Church of Christ's General Minister and President is reminding the church that some do not have that luxury this year — particularly those in Gaza. Palestine.

Rev. Karen Georgia Thompson, along her leadership counterparts with the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) and the United Church of Canada — the Rev. Terri Hord Owens and the Rev. Carmen Lansdowne, respectively — signed a letter delivered Dec. 18 to President Biden, urging the U.S. government to "show moral courage" and help bring an immediate end to the crisis.

As violence in Gaza continues, despite increasing calls for a ceasefire, Thompson explained that the Patriarchs and Heads of Churches in Jerusalem have asked theirchurches to forego any "unnecessary festive activities" during the holidays.

"Churches in the Middle East will commemorate — not celebrate — Christmas this year," she said.

In solidarity, Thompson is asking those within and across the UCC to remember the plight of the people of Gaza as they tell the story of Christmas once again.

"As we approach the manger and Christmas this year, let us remember our Palestinian siblings and all who live with war and violence, and consider how we welcome the prince of Peace into our homes and hearts with hope and anticipation," Thompson said. "And remember the humble and harsh circumstances into which Jesus was born."
