I was listening to Richard Rohr this morning talking about how Western Civilization has trained us to have a dualistic mind: good/bad, black/white, and us/them. The Apostle Paul definitely didn't think dualistically in his letters. He often began his letters by telling people how filled with the Spirit they were, needing nothing, and full of love; and then he would spend the rest of the letter correcting their theology, their behavior, and sometimes even their eating habits. To him, they were both saints and sinners, children of God, fully heirs to the kingdom—and childish, not ready for real spiritual meat, only drinking from the sippy cup.

We are seeing the fruits of dualistic thinking right now in our political realm where all Republicans have to hate any Democrat politician and the reverse is also true. This is being brought to a head in the current deficit ceiling negotiations where the House Leader Representative McCarthy seems willing to crash not just the United States' economy, but also the world's just to make President Biden and liberals look bad. There are lots of other issues tied into this as well. However, when the stakes could be 85 million lost jobs in our country alone, to me, it shows they (many Republican leaders) care more about winning than people.

I really hope we can find our way through yet another political crisis and start moving toward a more peaceful and productive way of running our country and working through our different views and models of being a nation.
