### A Mighty River Amos 5: 24

### Worship in October

**October 1st 4th Sunday of the Season of Creation (River Sunday)**, in the 2nd creation story we have the four major rivers coming from the Garden of Eden in the Middle East and in the last days when Heaven comes to Earth it is centered by the River of Life. What is it about rivers that capture our imagination and feed our souls? How do they help cleanse our world and nourish all life? Let us close out our Season of Creation by giving thanks for rivers and the life they bring. We will also be having our Neighbor In Need Offering this day.

**October 8th 19th Sunday of Pentecost**, our local Jazz players, led by Mike Debevec, will lead a jazz-styled liturgy with communion. On this day, we will explore the 10 commandments and compare how they are like notes on the scale that can produce a variety of styles and ways to live and share our faith.

**October 15th 20th Sunday of Pentecost**, we will be exploring Paul's letter to the Philippians in his closing, lifting up the highest ideals and goals for any Christian community. These are a little different than the Fruits of the Spirit, but they still lift up the goals of our faith.

**October 22nd 21st Sunday of Pentecost**, on this Sunday we are switching from the Revised Common Lectionary which we have been following the past three years and work our way into the Narrative Lectionary. This year's Lectionary focuses on the Gospel of Mark. However, we don't start the gospel story until the birth of Christ. So we will be walking through some Hebrew Testament scriptures, stories, and prophets. This Sunday is the story of King David bringing the Ark of the Covenant into the capital city and how he dances with joy! So get ready to move in our sanctuary this Sunday.

**October 29th 22nd Sunday of Pentecost**, on this Sunday, for our sermon, we are again at a fifth Sunday so we will conduct the Pester the Pastor. This is a time to explore ideas, concerns, and questions maybe Pastor Enno has brought up in previous sermons, writings, or conversations, or what is in our Bible, our history, the present or future of our church. Scripture, following the Narrative Lectionary, will be centered on the story of how David's throne split in two after his son Solomon died.

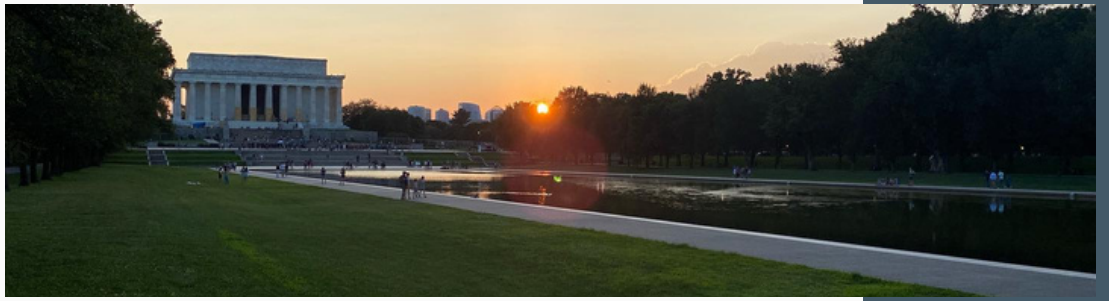

### Embrace the Suck

I had a friend in seminary who at 7:00 pm each night would get out his Christian CD's (90's groups) and blast them and sing for an hour. He did this the first year and came away feeling great and full of the Spirit. During the second year, the shine started to wash off and by the end of the year it left him empty. We had a weekly small group and in our discussion we discerned that God was asking him to go deeper, not just singing praise, but maybe more listening. We encouraged him to start something new, but not to give up his time of seeking the Spirit.

Not just about every saint, but every single saint went through what John of the Cross called, "The Dark Night of the Soul". Mother Theresa, a saint from last century (yes, the 1900's are now a part of history and no longer current), wrote that she herself went decades without feeling the Spirit, but continued to care for the least of these. We now regard and hold her in high esteem, not because she served with joy, rather because she served when she really didn't feel like it.

I was watching a Bass lesson on YouTube and the teacher was saying in his youth, when it became boring or burdensome, he would just stop practicing and believed he couldn't go any further. What he now encourages the younger or newer bass guitarists to do is "embrace the suck" and keep playing, practicing, and going especially when we aren't feeling it or think we are making progress.

I do imagine that youth group for most was a good experience, confirmation wasn't, and anytime, as an adult, the shine wore off pretty quickly and not a whole lot of Spirit. We may be just armchair mystics or saints, but to grow we have to continue in our practice of prayer and discipleship and worship, as Yogi Bera once said, "Half the battle is showing up 90% of the time."

God is planting seeds, nurturing them, and they are growing if we keep cultivating, nourishing, and weeding our soil/souls. We may not see them, but I am pretty sure that others do and they are blessed for it.

Opening conversations --reading of mission statement, sharing joys and concerns, this month's question and reading of communications agreement.

Urgent Business and Housekeeping:

1. August minutes were approved online and published in the Sept. Shining Light newsletter.

2. Proposed agenda approved.

3. Financial report--Kevin Le Voir--approved. Filed in office. Income at beginning of August: \$1271, by end: \$8062. Donations sent to Maui and Ukraine. Last two months were relatively lean, typical for this time of year. Bills being covered. \$9,000. in Bank. Neighbors in Need Offering Oct. 1. Details can be seen in the church office. 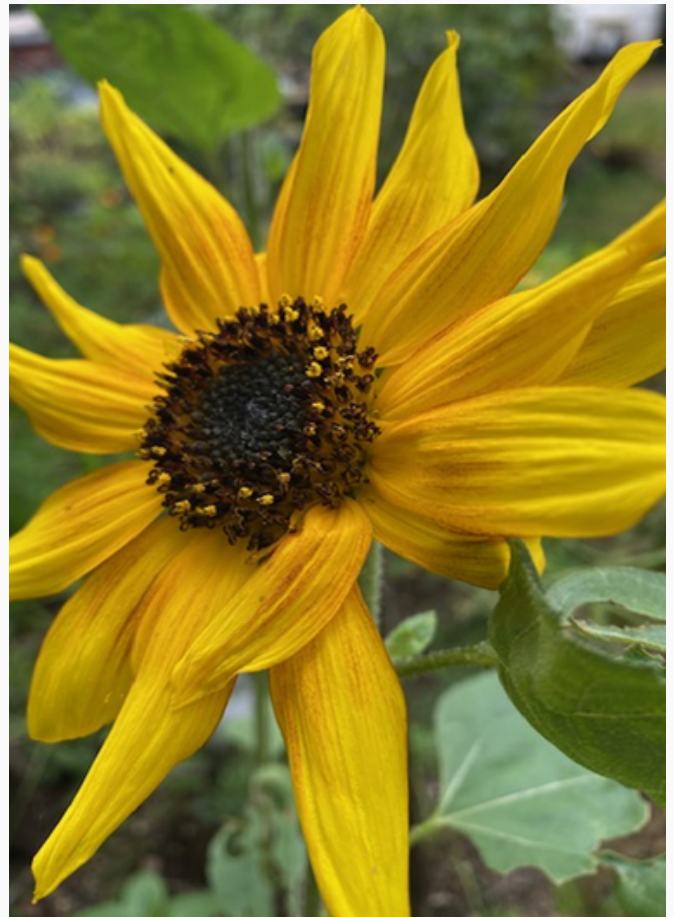

# EXPLORING PROCESS THEOLOGY

In our first discussion group we watched A (Not So) Brief Introduction to Process Theology by Danny Coleman and explored these questions:

Do you believe in a God who is outside time or inside time? How do you define God as eternal, omniscient, and omnipresent? What is the difference between knowing the future and knowing all possible futures? What is the revelation of God's vision and our response in process theology? How would you define time? Does block time or presentism fit your idea of time and universe more? Does God only influence our actions and universe or can God coerce to God's will? Is Jesus our model for how to follow God? Does God suffer with the universe or is God immutable? Are humans the pinnacle of creation and are we alone in the universe? How much of a free will choice do humans have? Is God present in all lives or can we really be abandoned by God? If God is so good, why is there evil? How does process theology define omnipotence? How then is prayer and worship defined?

We will keep circling back to these and others as we gather on [Wednesday afternoons at 3:00 pm \(in person or on Zoom\)](#). We will be listening to teachers and professors on videos and discussing the differences between systematic theology and how it can be applied to the church today. This group is all about learning, there will be no tests, just good discussion we hope.

# Minnesota Conference News

Dear Minnesota Conference UCC community,

The prophet Jeremiah reminds us of God's steadfast guidance in our lives, and proclaims God's beautiful promise of a future brimming with goodness and hope. **Today I take confidence in that promise as I share the news that my time as your Conference Minister will soon conclude.**

I have accepted the appointment of the UCC's General Minister & President to serve as the **Acting Associate General Minister of Wider Church Ministries (UCC) and the Co-Executive of Global Ministries (UCC and Disciples of Christ)**. My ministry here in Minnesota will end on December 29.



During these ten years we have been in ministry together, we have experienced a season marked by treasured relationships, faithful discernment, enormous change for the Church at large, and events in our state and nation that have challenged and shaped us all. The next three months will offer many opportunities for reflection on our shared ministry and all the specific moments that have made it so rich and fulfilling. For now, know that I give thanks for all you have taught me, for the laughter and tears and prayers we've shared, and for all the ways we've witnessed to the love, justice, and mercy of a God who never fails to walk with us. I'm tremendously grateful for the ministries and people of the Minnesota Conference and have truly been blessed to spend this time among you.

My new call represents a "full circle" moment for me. I will have the blessing of overseeing and engaging more fully in ministries that have personally transformed me and profoundly shaped my faith, including: global ministries, disaster response and recovery, volunteer ministries, and public policy advocacy. I'll have the joy of witnessing to our shared mission in the Church, in this country and with our partners around the world, something about which I've long been passionate. It feels like an extraordinary opportunity to give back some measure of all God has given. I am amazed and humbled by how God has led me to this unexpected moment and ask your prayers that I will be sufficient to the task.

In the United Church of Christ Book of Worship, the liturgy of farewell includes these words:

*"I thank you for the love, kindness, and support shown me all these years. I ask forgiveness for the mistakes I have made. I am grateful for the ways my leadership has been accepted. As I leave I carry with me all that I have learned here. I trust that our time together, and now our parting, are pleasing to God."*

This is my prayer as we spend these last months together. May our time remaining be filled with a spirit of gratitude and mutual care, and may we trust that God promises to all a future where hope flourishes.

# Tens of thousands of climate activists march in NYC

At least 75,000 climate activists showed up Sunday, Sept. 17 in New York City as part of the March to End Fossil Fuels. People of many faith perspectives were represented, including the United Church of Christ. The national UCC, along with the Southern New England Conference, signed on as partner organizations of the march.

Speaking at the rally, U.S. Rep. Alexandria Ocasio Cortez (D-N.Y.) reminded marchers that they organize out of hope. The Rev. Lennox Yearwood, head of the Hip Hop Caucus, connected the climate movement to the fight for racial justice.

“There is nothing that can better describe the energy surrounding the march than the presence of God’s love,” she said. “From the people of many different faiths and walks of life joining together in purpose, the energy was palpable.”

Also in attendance was the Rev. Davida Foy Crabtree of Bloomfield, Conn., who said, “It’s wonderful what showing up for occasions like this does for one’s resolve. Everybody counts. One might think one can skip because, ‘What’s one less?’ But imagine if half those didn’t make it.”

The Rev. Nancy Leckerling, co-chair of the Environmental Ministry Team at First Church in Guilford, Conn., attended as well.

“What a colorful and joyful day it was,” she said. “The posters, the banners, the chants, the singing, the Raging Grannies, gathering with people from all over the country and world as we marched, and the amazing final rally ... We were so glad we were there to witness all this.”

Rev. Jim Antal, who has served as a special advisor on climate justice to the UCC General Minister and President, shared his experience and feelings from the march as well.

“During the March, I was filled with a sense of sober joy,” he said. “Sober, because it will take more than a march to make the economic and political transitions required to address the climate emergency. Joy, because the march proved that tens of thousands of people are ready to take action.”

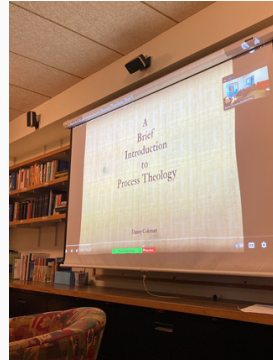
